

ARCHAEOLOGY AND CULTURAL HERITAGE (MINOR)

Departmental Guidelines and Mission Statement

The Minor in Archaeology and Cultural Heritage Studies aims to provide students with a foundation in the primary modes of knowledge production about the human past through broad engagement with material artifactual remains. Students develop their critical ability to investigate the natures of material culture and record of time that the material world presents, as well as the ongoing ethical implications involved in stewarding the human material past in museums and as heritage sites. Interdisciplinary in approach, while also housed in specific disciplines, students will develop skills in: archaeological techniques, analysis, and preservation; interpretation and analysis of the artistic, architectural, and other material remains of human societies; and the central concerns of preservation and curation. Students in ARCH engage in work that involves both independent inquiry and collaboration. They learn to synthesize diverse bodies of knowledge in deeply historical cross-cultural comparative frameworks. Through direct study with the material record, the student of ARCH learns to reveal and recover past lives, understanding how preservation of the material past shapes the present and prepares a kind of future.

Mission Statement

Archaeology and Cultural Heritage Studies (ARCH) is dedicated to educating students regarding the stewardship of legacies we inherit from our ancestors and pass on to future generations. Heritage can include material remains, monuments, landscapes, and intangible traditions. UNESCO, the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, calls heritage “irreplaceable sources of life and inspiration.” Uncovering heritage, ensuring its preservation, understanding the politics of memory, and engaging the public in the power of heritage requires a distinctive blend of humanistic and scientific methods. Effective training in ARCH demands understanding connections and common issues among diverse approaches. This interdivisional program draws together existing resources and faculty from Humanities, Fine Arts, Social Sciences, and Sciences to provide students with key skills and critical abilities to navigate the challenges of becoming stewards of heritage in the 21st century.

Archaeology is the study of human experience through material remains, and the impact cultural heritage has on the present. Most human experiences have gone unrecorded: because they occurred beyond the reach of written records, because those making records skipped them, or because the records are lost. Archaeology requires a distinctive combination of scientific and humanistic methods to uncover these lost realms of human experience and to ensure that they are preserved for the enrichment of future generations. Cultural heritage is the legacy and communication of that human experience as defined and redefined by those who lay claim to that past. Museums are one of the primary ways that the stories of archaeology and cultural heritage are told and sold to the public.”

Minor in Archaeology and Cultural Heritage

Archaeology and Cultural Heritage students are required to take a minimum of six courses as follows:

Distribution Requirements

Complete five additional 4-credit courses selected in consultation with the program director or ARCH advisor, focusing each student on a course of study that speaks to the specific learning and career goals of the student.

Elective courses must come from at least 2 of the core programs (AGRS, AHVC, ANTH, EESC)

At least two courses must be at the 300 level or above

For students majoring in the core programs of AGRS, AHVC, ANTH, or EESC, no more than 1 course of the five additional courses can count for both major and minor

Descriptions of Specific Requirements:

ARCH 400

Careers in Archaeology and Cultural Heritage (1 credit): Aided in part by professional collaborators (in person or via Zoom), this course will provide students with a common experience and crucial knowledge of the critical issues, theoretical problems, and career pathways in archaeology and cultural heritage management. This course also provides a framework for students to define their academic program and plan their experience/internship requirement (see below). A prerequisite for the course is declared minor and either previous or concurrent enrollment in ANTH 203.

ANTH 203

Introduction to Archaeology (4 credits): The goal of this course is to provide a robust grounding in archaeological ways of knowing. The course is divided into three sections: 1) Development, Aims, and Contractions; 2) Contemporary Techniques; 3) Contemporary Questions. The first section focuses on ways that archaeology and narratives about the past are embroiled in contemporary social dynamics. The middle of the course surveys techniques for learning about human experience from

material remains: from stone tools, to pollen grains, to isotopes. Where possible, the course offers hands-on experience with archaeological techniques. The final section of the class explores a sample of key questions in current archaeology. We intend to offer this course every semester and are developing a lab to accompany it.

Distribution Requirements

As an inherently multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary field, students are required to take courses in at least two of the core departments (AGRS, ANTH, EESC, AHVC and others) represented in the program. In consultation with the program director or through individual advising with a faculty member affiliated with the program, students will select courses from a list approved by the ARCH committee. All courses should speak to one or more aspects of the ARCH Mission Statement and Program Learning Goals. These five courses serve as a path for students to concentrate on specific aspects of archaeology, cultural heritage, and museums that coincide with their academic and career goals.

ARCH 380-390 Special Topics

As part of the minor, special topics courses cover various topics that do not necessarily rest within the discipline but are nonetheless relevant to the course of study. Examples might include courses focused on Archaeological Site Management, Art Crime and Looting, UNESCO and Global Cultural Heritage Management, Forensic Anthropology.

Experience/Internship Requirement

Students in this program are required to engage in an internship or research experience outside of standard course offerings. Several features of the curriculum are designed to develop students' imaginations about how to articulate their experience at Denison with opportunities that emerge after graduation.

Courses

ARCH 050 - ARCH Internship (0 Credit Hours)

Experience or internship related to archaeology, museums, or cultural heritage management approved by the ARCH committee – this could include specific study abroad courses, internships, or even summer scholar projects.

ARCH 380 - Special Topics in Archaeology and Cultural Heritage (4 Credit Hours)

This course covers a special topic that may satisfy one of the requirements within the ARCH minor. Special topics course numbers range between ARCH 380 and 390.

ARCH 400 - Careers and Issues in Archaeology and Cultural Heritage (1 Credit Hour)

This 1-credit course introduces students in the ARCH minor to the variety of careers and pathways for students with training in archaeology and cultural heritage. Each week, students explore a different pathway, either through readings and discussion, guest speakers in a specific field, or through field trips. This course also explores how certain skills learned in ARCH-designated courses prepare students for careers.

Prerequisite(s): ANTH 203 and a declared ARCH minor.
